

## **Getting Started**

Step One: Decide on your areas of research

**Step Two:** Search for the literature



## Finding Resources/Bibliography

**Step Three:** Find relevant books and articles:

Look specifically for these five things:

- 1. Claims, conclusions, and findings about the topic you are investigating
- 2. Definitions of terms
- 3. Calls for follow-up studies relevant to your topic
- 4. Gaps you notice in the literature
- 5. Disagreement about the ideas you are investigating



## **Research & Effective Writing**

- KEY CONSIDERATIONS:
- How to use language effectively to persuade, inform, educate, or entertain
- Rhetorical Situation: The circumstances in which you communicate

## **Considering Context**



#### **The Writer-Researcher**

 Your culture, personal characteristics and interests affect what you write about and how you write it.



#### **Considering Positionality**


- Your age
- Your experiences
- Your gender
- Your location
- Your political beliefs
- Your parents and peers
- Your education

## Telling a Good Story: Identifying Purpose



#### **Audience: To Whom are you Writing?**

- Many of the same factors which affect the writer also affect the audience
  - Age
  - Social class
  - Education
  - Past experience
  - Culture/subculture
  - Expectations



## **Writing about Research**

- Category of writing: qualitative research
- Always consider the purpose and the needs/expectations of the projected audience.

 Explore Your Favorite Kinds of Writing: fiction, autobiographical story, news article, review, letter to the editor/editorial, rhetorical analysis, criticism, essay

### **Steps to Take**

- 1. Research / Collect Resources
- 2. Draft an outline/mindmap
- 3. Create a thesis statement
- 4. Write the body of the text
- 5. Create an introduction that provides an overview of main points
- Prepare a conclusion that summarizes your thoughts and ends with further questions/ideas
